Infectious Diseases Coming To Our Area

A newly emerging infectious disease caused by a "flu" virus, called Canine Influenza, is making way to our area. Canine Influenza is a contagious strain of influenza A, a virus known as H3N8 is able to cause respiratory illness. Canine influenza virus only affects dogs.

Risk for infections is high for dogs that board at a kennel, go to doggie daycare, attend dog training, visit a groomer, or come into contact with other dogs. Risk is also higher for dogs that will be traveling to states that have reported cases of canine influenza.

Canine influenza spreads the same that human flu spreads - through direct contact (kissing, licking, nuzzling); through the air (coughing or sneezing); and via contaminated surfaces (such as when a person picks up the virus on their hands or clothing and then touches or pets a dog).

Recently a new canine influenza vaccine was approved for use in the US that has been clinically proven to significantly reduce the severity of influenza and the length of time that a dog is sick. The initial vaccination requires 2 doses, 2-4 weeks apart, followed by annual revaccination. If your dog is presently being vaccinated for kennel cough (Bordetella), it is likely candidate for Canine Influenza Vaccine.

Lepto found in more than 20 dog in Detroit

More than 20 cases of leptospirosis, a life-threatening bacterial infection that can cause fatal damage to dogs and can be transmitted to humans, have been reported in Detroit-area dogs in the past three weeks, states the Michigan State University's Diagnostic Center for Population and Animal Health.

In most cases, the dogs affected were not vaccinated against leptospirosis, or no one knew about their vaccination history, according to the MSU center, a service unit of the College of Veterinary Medicine, and so far 9 of the dogs have been euthanized. This particular type of leptospirosis is associated with contact with rats, so stray dogs are at highest risk. But this time, the dogs who got sick were pets, which is very unusual, Carole Bolin, director of the Diagnostic Center, told Mlive.com. She expects to see more cases of this "very dangerous type of leptospirosis."

This contagious disease affecting both animals and humans, and spread by infection with a bacterial pathogen called Leptospira, may result in chronic liver and kidney disease and may even be fatal. Over the past 30 years, preventative vaccination against two of the most common Leptospires, L. canicola and L.icterohaemorrhagiae, have nearly eradicated clinical disease associated with these strains among the inoculated population.

A leptospirosis vaccine was routinely administered to dogs in Detroit in the past. But as the disease became less prevalent, the risks of vaccination outweighed the risks of contracting the disease, and finally no vet was administering anymore.

But now things changed, and Carole Bolin recommends dog owners need to call their veterinarians to get more information regarding vaccination.

The strain of leptospirosis in question, Leptospira icterohaemorrhagiae, can cause severe disease in humans and animals. It is commonly carried by rats but dogs can transmit it to other dogs and to humans. Dogs can appear normal one day and be very ill the next day. They contaminate the environment with living leptospira when they pee. Pets can become infected by sniffing this urine or by contacting standing water that becomes contaminated by rain and water runoff.

Waiting For The Cure . . . Dog Getting Warehoused

Recently, the maker of the drug used to treat heartworm infection in dogs announced that they ran out of stock and it was not available.

The company didn't know how long the outage would last, but expected it to be several weeks or months. What do we do about the Heartworm positive dogs that were coming into the program? It's always disheartening when our newly rescued dogs test positive for Heartworm disease. Had they only been provided the cheap monthly pill or six month injection from their previous owner, but alas, had they been provided with the proper care, they wouldn't be in the situation that needed our intervention in the first place.

With this news, their treatment would surely be delayed. Our volunteers called local vet office after vet office, only to be told they had none in stock. Meanwhile, our Heartworm positive dogs, waited, and waited, with no treatment.

Finally, on September 30, 2011, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced that they were allowing the manufacturer to import limited quantities of the drug from their European supplier. We were able to provide our dogs with the two painful, deep muscular injections, and subsequent two months of extreme strict activity.

The limited supply will surely be a temporary fix at a greater cost, but

Holiday Safety For Our Pets

Holly, Jolly and Oh-So-Safe! Of course you want to include your furry companions in the festivities, pet parents, but as you celebrate this holiday season, try to keep your pet's eating and exercise habits as close to their normal routine as possible. And be sure to steer them clear of the following unhealthy treats, toxic plants and dangerous decorations:

O Christmas Tree

Securely anchor your Christmas tree so it doesn't tip and fall, causing possible injury to your pet. This will also prevent the tree water-which may contain fertilizers that can cause stomach upset-from spilling. Stagnant tree water is a breeding ground for bacteria and your pet could end up with nausea or diarrhea should he imbibe.

Tinsel-less Town

Kitties love this sparkly, light-catching "toy" that's easy to bat around and carry in their mouths. But a nibble can lead to a swallow, which can lead to an obstructed digestive tract, severe vomiting, dehydration and possible surgery. It's best to brighten your boughs with something other than tinsel.

No Feasting for the Furries

By now you know not to feed your pets chocolate and anything sweetened with xylitol, but do you know the lengths to which an enterprising fur kid will go to chomp on something yummy? Make sure to keep your pets away from the table and unattended plates of food, and be sure to secure the lids on garbage cans.

Toy Joy

Looking to stuff your pet's stockings? Choose gifts that are safe.

Dogs have been known to tear their toys apart and swallowing the pieces, which can then become lodged in the esophagus, stomach or intestines. Stick with chew toys that are basically indestructible, Kongs that can be stuffed with healthy foods or chew treats that are designed to be safely digestible.

Long, stringy things are a feline's dream, but the most risky toys for cats involve ribbon, yarn and loose little parts that can get stuck in the intestines, often necessitating surgery. Surprise kitty with a new ball that's too big to swallow, a stuffed catnip toy or the interactive cat dancer-and tons of play sessions together.

Forget the Mistletoe & Holly

Holly, when ingested, can cause pets to suffer nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Mistletoe can cause gastrointestinal upset and cardiovascular problems. And many varieties of lilies can cause kidney failure in cats if ingested. Opt for just-as-jolly artificial plants made from silk or plastic, or choose a pet-safe bouquet.

That Holiday Glow

Don't leave lighted candles unattended. Pets may burn themselves or cause a fire if they knock candles over. Be sure to use appropriate candle holders, placed on a stable surface. And if you leave the room, put the candle out!

Wired Up

Keep wires, batteries and glass or plastic ornaments out of paws' reach. A wire can deliver a potentially lethal electrical shock and a punctured battery can cause burns to the mouth and esophagus, while shards of breakable ornaments can damage your pet's mouth.

House Rules

If your animal-loving guests would like to give your pets a little extra attention and exercise while you're busy tending to the party, ask them to feel free to start a nice play or petting session.

Put the Meds Away

Make sure all of your medications are locked behind secure doors, and be sure to tell your guests to keep their meds zipped up and packed away, too.

Careful with Cocktails

If your celebration includes adult holiday beverages, be sure to place your unattended alcoholic drinks where pets cannot get to them. If ingested, your pet could become weak, ill and may even go into a coma, possibly resulting in death from respiratory failure.

A Room of Their Own

Give your pet his own quiet space to retreat to-complete with fresh water and a place to snuggle. Shy pups and cats might want to hide out under a piece of furniture, in their carrying case or in a separate room away from the hubbub.

New Year's Noise

As you count down to the new year, please keep in mind that strings of thrown confetti can get lodged in a cat's intestines, if ingested, perhaps necessitating surgery. Noisy poppers can terrify pets and cause possible damage to sensitive ears.

2nd Half Of PetSmart Litter Patrol Grant

We are very hanny to report that Planned Pethood has been chosen

by PetSmart Charities to receive a 2-year, \$15,000 per year, Litter Patrol Grant. We have completed the first year and await our second check. Litter Patrol is Planned Pethood's innovative program developed by Kathy Kozak and Karen Latta in 2005.

This program utilizes volunteers to contact people giving away "free"



puppies and kittens. Spay/neuter assistance is then provided for these animals as well as any other dogs and cats in the household that are not fixed. As space permits puppies and kittens are taken into Planned Pethood's adoption program. We believe that spay/neuter is the ultimate rescue. Our Litter Patrol program often breaks what has been an ongoing cycle of uncontrolled breeding. As always there are strict guidelines in order to qualify for assistance.

In the past Litter Patrol funding has been sporadic. This generous grant from PetSmart represents a significant step forward in funding these efforts for the next 2 years and will provide spay/neuter assistance for approximately 1,000 animals.

Appreciation goes to Jane Holman for preparing and submitting the grant proposal. Gratitude also goes to Jane Holman, Shirley Moran and Sally Michaels for screening potential recipients of grant funds. HUGE thank you to Barb Garrett for managing and maintaining the data base of all recipients of the grant, generating and mailing the vouchers and reporting spending to the treasurer. Thank you to Yark Automotive Group for donating the paper, envelopes and postage to help those in our community.
