Did You See Us?

Earth Day at Highland Park- Carol Dunn hung out with like minded people to celebrate Earth Day. She passed out information about spay/neuter and made some new contacts in the community. **Owens State Community College's Safety Day** – Denise Pheils is an advisor at OCC and invited PPI to attend. We passed out information about having pets in cars during the summer, protecting pets from falls from windows, heart worm disease, flea control, etc.

Walbridge School- In conjunction with Humane Ohio, PPI has aggressively been posting flyers in mailboxes, porches and doors promoting spay/neuter. Our phones are ringing off the hook! One early Wednesday morning, volunteers met at Walbridge Elementary to transport several cats to Humane Ohio.

Kitty Population EXPLODES

PPI continues to get calls about kittens needing help. For 2-3 months, we will continue to receive more and more calls. Without exaggeration, in early spring PPI was getting 100 calls a day. By mid-summer it escalated to 300 calls a day. Often we need help transporting these kittens to the vet to get them spay/neutered. <u>We must stop the breeding cycle!</u> There are 71,000 free roaming cats in Lucas County alone.

Transportation Volunteers Needed

We are in desperate need of volunteers willing to help transport animals to and from vet appointments in this area. We need help transporting cats from anywhere from the from around Toledo to Humane Ohio to be spay/neutered. Other times we have animals that need to get rides from a foster home to an adoption event. With the price of gas fluctuating so much we need all the help we can get to transport these animals. Aggie is a 10-12 year old dachshund who found herself abandoned at a local dog pound. We couldn't leave this sweet, friendly little dog behind to spend her last days sleeping alone on concrete and so brought her into our adoption program.

When she was seen by our vet, she had to have 9 of her teeth pulled because they were in such bad shape. Unfortunately, our vet also had to remove 5 tumors, which have turned out to be benign. Unfortunately Aggie's foster mom has found yet another lump that will have to be removed. Poor Aggie. She has been through so much. Her foster mom loves her though, says she is welcome there for as long as she wants to stay

In spite of everything she's had to deal with over the last few weeks, Aggie is the happiest, most loving dog you could ever meet! She loves everyone and just wants to be by your side all the time!

Even though we know when we save an older dog like Aggie, it will be challenging to find an adoptive home, we still believe even these senior dogs deserve a second chance. Still the cost of Aggie's care so far is expensive, and we are waiting to hear what our vet

The eviction notice was tacked to the door and dated January 2009 when Planned Pethood volunteers were placing door to door flyers offering spay/neuter. Through a broken window from the porch 2 kittens and the family cat were resting among the pile of books, utensils, and belongings the family left behind in addition to the family pet. The scatter rugs showed a Christmas pattern so the kittens were most likely born after their mother was abandoned and never knew people except for the vagrants that had been in the home as evidenced by the broken and empty bottles of alcohol.

Little Carlen was found with a severe injury to his eye and had surgery to have his eye removed. We don't know if it was caused



from trauma or infection, but this poor little kitten has had a rough start to his life, and we hope to make the rest of his life a happier and healthy one. Even though he is shy and scared right now, we feel Carlen deserves care and attention so that he may have a loving is doing well, other than absolutely hating the party hat he has to wear around his neck. The injured eye was very small and abnormal and part of his lower eyelid had to be removed during the surgery. In order to close his wound, his lip on that side is pulled a bit upward like a 'joker smile' but that just adds to his charm. Carlen loves to be held and will just purr away, but is still scared and has the flight instinct when allowed to roam outside of his enclosure. He wants so badly to play with the other kittens too, but for now no roughhousing is allowed. You can follow Carlen updates on our website under <u>Featured</u>.

PPI Animals Repossessed

About two years ago, Starr & Spyke were found as strays within weeks of each other. The person who found them offered to foster both dogs. After several months, she adopted Starr & Spyke. Our screening process, which included a home visit, revealed nothing to be concerned about.

Recently a concerned citizen called PPI to report a home that had adopted animals from us. The concerned citizen made claims that the home was possibly mistreating the animals. This was especially troubling given the pet owner was someone well known to Planned Pethood volunteers as the person who found Starr & Spyke and several cats.

Planned Pethood is not in a position to investigate claims of cruelty. That's a job for Cruelty Investigators that work with the Toledo Area Humane Society (TAHS). We have no legal authority to assist in claims such as this. Nonetheless, we always take the claims seriously.

The Cruelty Investigators were alerted to the possible situation. In the end, the home owner (and adopter from PPI) surrendered all the animals in the home to the TAHS. This included Starr & Spyke and 60 cats. The two dogs were being kept in





one room. All 60 cats were kept together in another one room. The smell of cat urine could be smelled from outside the house. The animals had evidence of a severe flea infestation. The Cruelty Investigator says at first look the cats all had upper respiration infections, eye infections, most tested positive for FIV, very thin and missing hair. The home owner was allowing the animals to be left alone for 23 hours out of the day, alone in those rooms.

The bad news is that all 60 cats were euthanized. This is never easy to report

However, one should consider the life they were living, was it really a quality life? A huge thank you to all the PPI foster homes that offered to take any cats they could.

Luckily, we got <u>Starr</u> and <u>Spyke</u> back and after a little time in our foster homes, they are back on track. Both dogs are reported as being basically perfect by their foster homes.

Thanks to the Toledo Area Humane Society and their Executive Director, John Dinon, for rescuing these helpless animals.

It's the responsibility of everyone to protect the animals in our community. If you think an animal is being abused or neglected please call Cruelty Investigation at 419-891-9777. You can leave an anonymous message or you can leave your name and number. The officers are out in the field, so you will be put into a voicemail box. Please provide an address, with zip code and any supporting information you think will be helpful.

Why Does PPI Need An Executive Director?

There will always be discussions among volunteers, supporters and donators as to what is the best way money should be spent within a non-profit organization. One of the ways Planned Pethood has decided to spend some of our money is in the hiring of an Executive Director. Simply put, an Executive Director is the glue that holds the rest of the group together. I want to take this opportunity to provide some information to our supporters regarding our Executive Director.

Planned Pethood has out grown it's small, grass-roots style of leadership. No longer can the President and the Vice-President handle all the demands and duties that need to occur for Planned Pethood to move along smoothly and to grow.

An Executive Director is expected to run the daily operations of the organization, manage volunteers and committees and develop plans in concert with the board for the future development of PPI. This includes getting us more money, getting us more media attention, getting us more volunteers and making sure we function in the most effective manner possible. Planned Pethood's Executive Director, Nikki Morey, makes reports to the board at every board meeting. She also provides an oral report to me once a week.

Planned Pethood has seen a marked increase in a positive public image within the six months Nikki has officially been our Executive Director. With the increased public image and increased communication with our volunteers and supporters it has garnered PPI a small increase in giving. I find this to be especially important during this economic downturn. To be eligible for some grants and for a Better Business Bureau accreditation, PPI must have specific policies and contingency plans in place, which Nikki has been working to complete.

While some may question the wisdom of spending money on the position of an E.D., the board sees the merit. The duties I have listed above are just a small portion of the time Nikki spends on Planned Pethood business. Duties that are important to how we operate and must be done in a timely manner volunteers can't be expected to do. Not having an E.D. seems to me like stepping over dollars to pick up pennies.




The list of merchants participating is a long one, filled with places most people already shop, eat or frequent.
